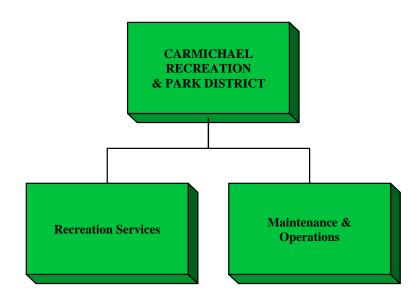

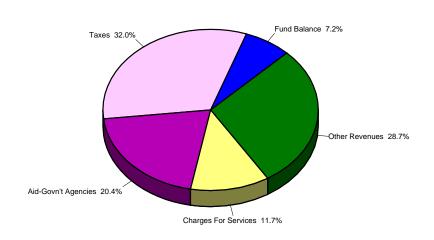
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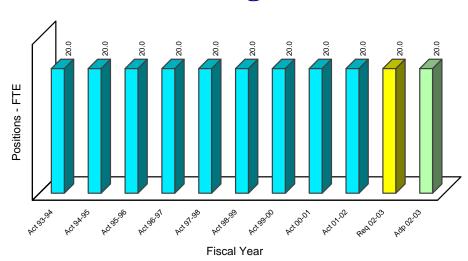
Departmental Structure



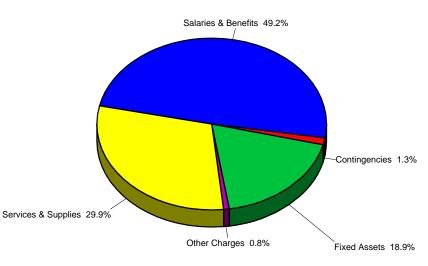

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

The Carmichael Recreation and Park District is responsible for:

- Providing park and recreation services for the 42,000 residents of the unincorporated area within portions of Carmichael and Fair Oaks, a 9.25 square mile area.
- Maintaining 199.3 acres of parkland; 106.2 acres are developed, with 93.4 acres remaining undeveloped (16 park site facilities).
- Coordinating recreational activities at more than 14 school sites as well as the District's recreational centers at three park sites.
- Acting as co-sponsors for many community groups and organizations, working to facilitate and provide for numerous projects and programs.
- Operating a pool, tennis courts, ballfields, soccer fields, basketball courts, playgrounds, picnic areas, outdoor amphitheater (stage and band shell), volleyball courts, disc/golf courses, botanical garden and nature areas.

Since 1984, improving, operating and maintaining the La Sierra Community Center, consisting of 36.8 acres of land and 145,700 square feet of building. Until September 26, 2000, the site was leased by the County to the Carmichael Recreation and Park District. Subsequently, the County has transferred ownership to the District. Amenities include basketball/volleyball gymnasiums, a community hall, theatre, fine arts center, office, meeting rooms, tenant space, hard surface courts, sports complex, maintenance shop, and Sacramento County Sheriff's Work Project and Toy Project.

MISSION:

The mission of the Carmichael Recreation and Park District is to satisfy the recreational needs of the community by providing a wide range of facilities and opportunities to enrich the quality of life.

GOALS:

- Encourage community involvement and responsibility through collaborative efforts and partnerships.
- Promote the usage of district facilities, programs and opportunities by ALL members of the community.
- Modernize, renovate and maintain the existing developed facilities and recreational areas.
- Improve and expand community services and programs to meet dynamic community needs.
- Secure sufficient resources to achieve district's five-year goals.
- Continue to promote open space.

SIGNIFICANT DEVELOPMENTS DURING 2001-02:

- Continued to program with the North Area Teen Center targeting local area
 youths, with programs such as the Mid Summer Nights Swim and allowing
 use of district facilities. We also use teen volunteers for district special
 events, such as the LS Skate Park events, Canine Craze judges, etc.
- Carmichael Park Dog Park Installed lighting to allow for evening use and concrete pads to reduce wet areas. We continue to work with Carmichael Dog Park Society (CDPS) to identify and prioritize additional needs.
- Carmichael Park District Office Improved image, technology, and communication by replacing office furniture, carpet and tile, texturing and painting walls, replacing outdated telephone/voice mail system and installing new computer equipment and system.
- Carmichael Park Linda LeRoi Memorial Playground Removal and replacement of the playground structure and playground surface. The playground was out of compliance with the new playground safety

- standards. Replacement was made possible by combining district resources and a grant through California Integrated Waste Management Board, made possible through partial use of Proposition 12 funds. The playground structure and surface were made from recycled plastic and rubber.
- Carmichael Park Pool Removed and replaced the outdated and out of compliance chlorinating system.
- La Sierra Skate Park Lighting and additional equipment has been added to the skate park. The 12,000 square foot park consists of 6' and 12' half pipes, launch ramps, grinding rails, fun boxes, etc. The Park continues to be a welcomed attraction to local area youth and at-risk youth.
- La Sierra Community Center Began a landscape project which included, new concrete walkways, irrigation system, trees and garden beds.
- La Sierra Community Center Upgraded electrical service on the north end to address additional need requirements of tenants.
- District Wide Installation of a Monument Signs at Del Campo Park, Glancy Oaks Park, Bird Track Park, and Cardinal Oaks Park. Installed a bronze memorial plaque at Capra Park.
- O'Donnell Heritage Park aka Mapel Lane Park Site Continued development with the construction of two acres of turf, installation of a sprinkler system, a joint project with the Carmichael Water District for a future well site, installation of electrical service and dawn to dusk street lighting. The design was a result of neighborhood opinion and available funding. Funding was available through a land sale at the Mapel Lane Site.
- Sutter-Hollister Park Site Opened a section of the park for public use.

- Continue to work with the North Area Teen Center to program, meeting the needs of teens in the Carmichael Community.
- Continue to expand programs with limited resources.
- Carmichael Park Band Shell Restoration Complete Phase II/III, consisting
 of extending walkways to parking areas and restrooms, providing a storage
 area and back sidewalk, and moving an electrical service panel.
- Carmichael Park Water Line Complete renovation of water line and service into Carmichael Park.
- Carmichael Park Pool Contract with an engineer to evaluate and prepare study/plans to address the pool drainage system.

- Districtwide Continue to update park amenities, such as, picnic tables, BBQ pits/grills, and drinking fountains. Renovate playgrounds, districtwide, to meet new Playground Safety Standards. Playgrounds must be in compliance by January 2003. Address asphalt deterioration in parking areas at district parks.
- La Sierra Community Center Improvements General improvements to address deferred rehabilitation projects and to update appearance, including re-roofing/coating roofs, gas line improvement, John Smith Hall improvements, replace and improve lighting in the gyms, work with our Community tenants, Sacramento Fine Arts Center and Chautuaqua Theatre/Playhouse to address their air conditioning needs, installing additional concrete walkways, landscaped areas and irrigation systems.
- La Sierra Community Center Sierra Rooms Installation of restrooms and kitchenette.
- La Sierra Skate Park Add more equipment to the street course, install a retaining wall and landscape the area surrounding the park to provide shade.
- O'Donnell Heritage Park Complete Phase I development.
- Complete miscellaneous small projects as budget permits.

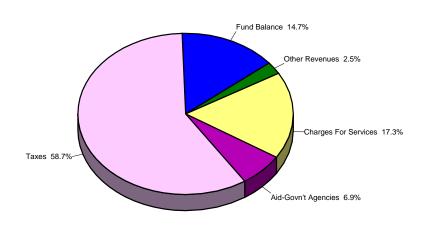

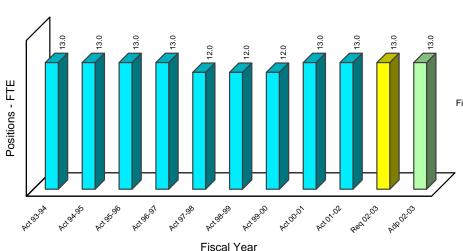

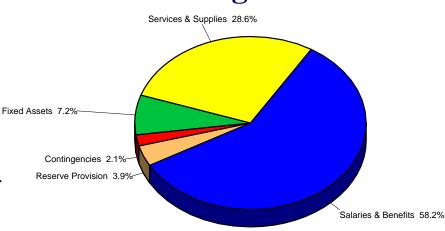

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

- The Mission Oaks Recreation and Park District is a dependent special district governed by a five-member Advisory Board of Directors appointed by the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors; the Board of Supervisors serve as ex-officio Directors of the district. It covers a 9.1 square mile area in the Arden-Arcade and Carmichael communities of Sacramento County, an area of approximately 62,500 residents. The Mission Oaks Recreation and Park District:
 - Provides recreation programs and services to residents, including preschoolers, youth, adults, and senior adults.
 - Maintains 11 district-owned parks (88.75 acres).
 - Maintains four school parks (13.7 acres).

MISSION:

To improve the quality of life for Mission Oaks residents by providing varied, interesting, and enjoyable recreation programs for all ages, and parks and facilities that are safe, clean, functional and aesthetically pleasing.

GOALS:

- Complete the listed park projects by the end of Fiscal Year 2002-03.
- Implement recommendations from the 1999-00 and 2000-01 audits.
- Continue with the development of a marketing and revenue-generating plan that will provide new activities for the community.
- Continue with the development and implementation of the district employee data base.

- Replaced all the windows in District Office for energy efficiency and safety.

- Replacement of drapery at the Gibbons Community Center.
- Replacement of shade shelter at Ashton Park.
- Replacement of play equipment at Valley Oak Park.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

- Natomas Fire District funds the provision of fire protection services to approximately 40 square miles of the Unincorporated Area in the northwestern portion of Sacramento County. Natomas Fire District is a dependent special district; and the Board of Supervisors serves as the Board of Directors for the District.
- Fire protection service is actually provided by the Fire Department of the City of Sacramento. The District and the City entered into the contract in Fiscal Year 1984-85. All district assets, including equipment and real property, were turned over to the City. The City absorbed all district employees who did not retire at the time.
- The contract calls for the annual payment to the City for the fire protection service to amount to all available financing, less administrative expenditures such as biannual audits, property tax administration fees, and administrative service charges.

- District financing consists of property taxes (including the homeowners subvention), interest earnings, and fund balances.
- The Community Development and Neighborhood Assistance Agency is responsible for monitoring the contract with the City and preparing the district budget.

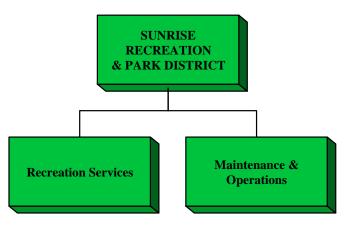

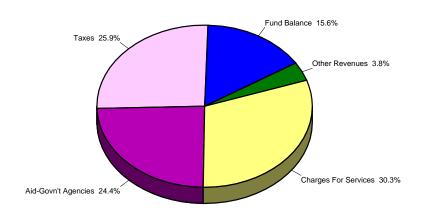

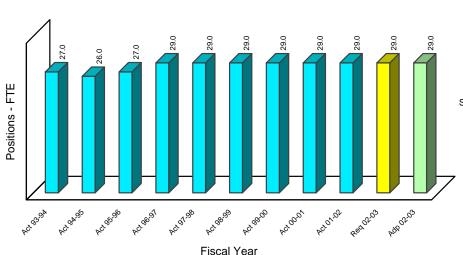
Departmental Structure



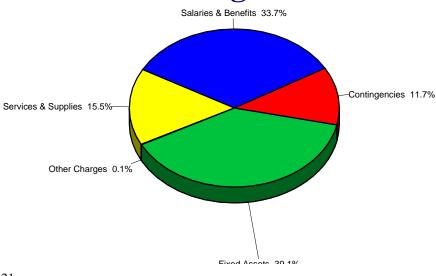

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

• Provides park facilities and recreation services for the City of Citrus Heights, and the unincorporated communities of Antelope and Foothill Farms, a 27 square mile area in northern Sacramento County.

MISSION:

The mission of the Sunrise Recreation and Park District is to be responsive to its communities' needs for an enhanced quality of life and to advocate for positive social interaction by offering a variety of affordable recreation and learning

opportunities to individuals of all ages and abilities; providing clean, safe well-designed parks and facilities; strengthening community image and sense of place; supporting economic development; promoting health and wellness; fostering human development; increasing cultural unity; protecting environmental resources; facilitating community problem solving; and collaborating with Community Partners.

GOALS:

Park Acquisition and Development

- Acquire sufficient park lands for present and future needs.
- Work closely with the City of Citrus Heights and the communities of Foothill Farms and Antelope to expand recreational opportunities, promote and enhance service delivery, and identify properties for acquisition.
- Assist in establishing multi-use trail and parkway systems within the District, consistent with the countywide system.
- Encourage the dedication of sufficient park lands and the provision of open space corridors associated with new development in an orderly manner harmonious with the District's Ten-Year Master Plan.
- Coordinate park site acquisition, development, and recreation programs with school districts, other special districts, county agencies, and related private organizations.

Programming

- Provide recreational opportunities and facilities to meet the physical, social, environmental and cultural programming needs of the District residents.
- Provide a park system which shall serve the needs of all ages, interest groups, and persons of varied economic levels.
- Foster community ownership by making District programs and facilities part of residents' lifestyles.
- Continue to expand recreational programs and opportunities conforming with public desire and the District's capabilities.

<u>Planning</u>

- Plan for the improvement of existing parks and development of proposed parks, maintaining a balance between active and passive recreational opportunities.
- Seek public input on park issues in an effort to enhance awareness of the District, its facilities, programs and services.
- Anticipate needs and recognize trends and innovations in appropriate technology.
- Utilize financial resources efficiently and equitably.

SIGNIFICANT DEVELOPMENTS IN 2001-02:

- Completion of second phase construction for Blue Oak Park.
- Re-roof of Rusch Swim Center Roof Buildings.
- Remodel of Rusch Community Center Rest Rooms.
- Preparation of Rusch Swim Center construction plans and solicitation of bids for pool construction.
- Development of second Master Plan for Antelope Community Park in coordination with the Roseville Joint Union High School District.
- Purchase of 5.5 acres of neighborhood parkland in Antelope.
- Acquired 7 acres of neighborhood parkland in Antelope through Quimby Act requirements associated with new residential development.
- Repaired concrete walkways at C Bar C Park.
- Replacement of play equipment, construct walkways, install shade structure, construct two tennis courts and a basketball court at Westwood Park.
- Filled two job vacancies: Superintendent of Recreation and Community Services and Recreation Services Manager.
- Development of potential revenue measure to enhance park maintenance and park capital construction in the Foothill Farms and Antelope Communities.
- Installed play equipment at Crosswoods Park.

- Preparation of plans and specifications for second phase construction of Antelope Community Park.
- Coordinate with developer and purchase "turn key" (Stock Ranch) Neighborhood Park site.
- Construct Rusch Community Park Swim Center.
- Construct Rusch Community Park Rest Room.
- Master Plan and develop construction drawings for Antelope Park Site G, Carriage Oaks Park Site, and Firestone Park Site.
- Install replacement play equipment at Eugene H. Ahner Park.
- Install replacement play equipment and repair concrete walkways at Westwood Park.
- Design and construct a Skate Park to be located at Rusch Community Park.
- Install radio communications tower at Rusch Community Park to support computerized irrigation in most of the District's parks.
