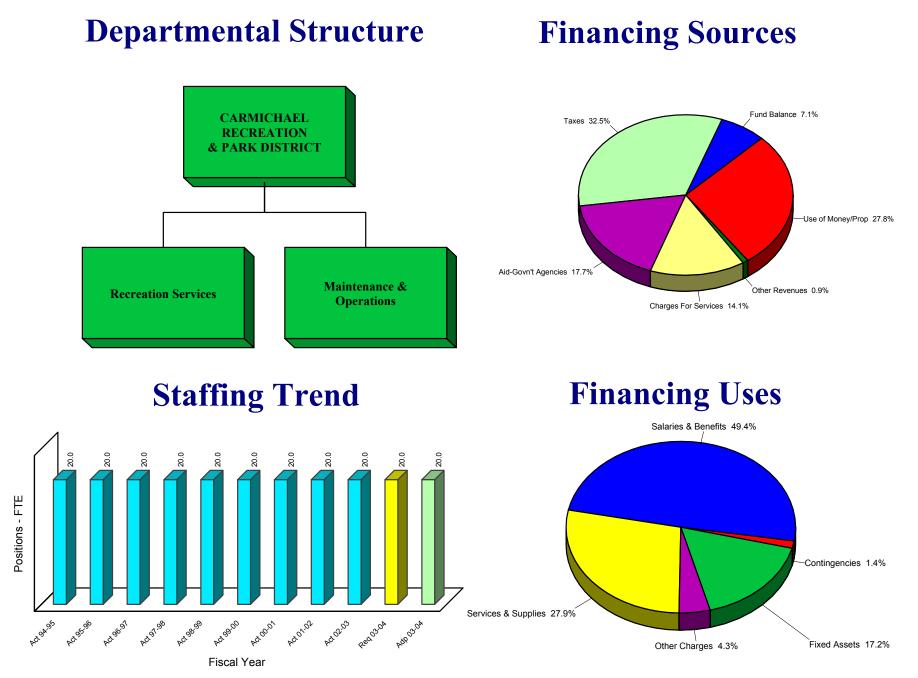

The Carmichael Recreation and Park District is responsible for:

- Providing park and recreation services for the 42,000 residents of the unincorporated area within portions of Carmichael and Fair Oaks, a 9.25 square mile area.
- Maintaining 199.3 acres of parkland; 106.2 acres are developed, with 93.4 acres remaining undeveloped (16 park site facilities).
- Coordinating recreational activities at more than 14 school sites as well as the District's recreational centers at three park sites.
- Acting as co-sponsors for many community groups and organizations, working to facilitate and provide for numerous projects and programs.
- Operating a pool, tennis courts, ball fields, soccer fields, basketball courts, playgrounds, picnic areas, outdoor amphitheater (stage and band shell), volleyball courts, disc/golf courses, botanical garden and nature areas.

• Since 1984, improving, operating and maintaining the La Sierra Community Center, consisting of 36.8 acres of land and 145,700 square feet of building. Until September 26, 2000, the site was leased by the County to the Carmichael Recreation and Park District. Subsequently, the County has transferred ownership to the District. Amenities include basketball/ volleyball gymnasiums, a community hall, theatre, fine arts center, office, meeting rooms, tenant space, hard surface courts, sports complex, and maintenance shop.

MISSION:

The mission of the Carmichael Recreation and Park District is to satisfy the recreational needs of the community by providing a wide range of facilities and opportunities to enrich the quality of life.

GOALS:

- Encourage community involvement and responsibility through collaborative efforts and partnerships.
- Promote the usage of district facilities, programs and opportunities by ALL members of the community.
- Modernize, renovate and maintain the existing developed facilities and recreational areas.
- Improve and expand community services and programs to meet dynamic community needs.
- Secure sufficient resources to achieve district's five-year goals.
- Continue to promote open space.

SIGNIFICANT DEVELOPMENTS DURING 2002-03:

- Carmichael Park Pipeline Project, Phase I Completed the first phase of the project to renovate the water lines and service in Carmichael Park. The project was funded through Proposition 12 funds.
- Carmichael Park Pool Contracted with an engineer to evaluate and prepare study/plans to address the pool drainage system; undertook a major repair of the pool liner and leaks.
- La Sierra Fire Alarm Completed a study and developed a set of plans and specifications for the installation of a center wide fire alarm and emergency evacuation system.
- La Sierra Gymnasiums Installed a new, energy efficient lighting system in both gymnasiums.
- La Sierra Maintenance Storage Loft Expanded and installed additional storage and work areas at the La Sierra Maintenance Shop.
- La Sierra Community Center, Community Tenants Installed an air conditioning system for the Chautuaqua Theatre/Playhouse. The 2003

summer season was the first cooled season. Replaced the roof and installed new window treatments for the Sacramento Fine Arts Center. These community tenant projects were funded through the County of Sacramento, under the La Sierra Transfer Agreement.

• Sutter-Hollister Park Site – The Carmichael Community Garden Committee, developed a community garden at the Sutter-Hollister park site with cooperation of the Park District.

- Carmichael Park:
 - Band Shell Restoration Complete Phase II/III, consisting of extending walkways to parking areas and restrooms, providing a storage area and back sidewalk, and moving an electrical service panel.
 - Water Line Final Phase, Complete renovation of water line and service into Carmichael Park.
 - Tennis Courts Re-surface the tennis courts and practice areas.
 - Clubhouse Improvement involving drop ceiling, new lights, and additional storage.
- La Sierra Community Center
 - Smith Hall facelift improvements and Sierra Rooms Restrooms and Kitchen installation.
 - General improvements to address deferred rehabilitation projects, including roofing/coating roofs, gas line improvement, John Smith Hall improvements, Sacramento Fine Arts Center and Chautuaqua Theatre/Playhouse to address their air conditioning needs, installing additional concrete walkways, landscaped areas and irrigation systems.
 - Installation of restrooms and kitchenette.
 - La Sierra Skate Park Add more equipment to the street course, install a retaining wall and landscape the area surrounding the park to provide shade.
- O'Donnell Heritage Park aka Mapel Lane Park Site Continue development with the construction of two acres of turf, installation of a sprinkler system, a joint project with the Carmichael Water District for a future well site, installation of electrical service and dawn to dusk street lighting. The design was a result of neighborhood opinion and available funding. Funding was available through a land sale at the Mapel Lane Site.
- Districtwide Continue to update park amenities, such as, picnic tables, BBQ pits/grills, and drinking fountains. Renovate playgrounds, district-wide, to meet new Playground Safety Standards. Playgrounds must be in compliance by January 2003. Address asphalt deterioration in parking areas at district parks.

- Parking lot overlay, installation of basketball and volleyball courts and installation of new play equipment at Swanston Park.

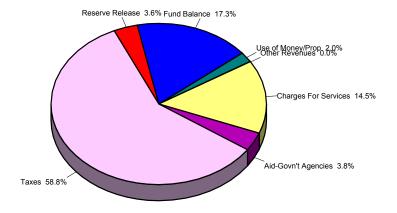
- Replacement of play equipment at Mission North, Swanston, and Sierra Oaks Parks.

- Projects to be determined include the installation of a splash park feature and a portable classroom.

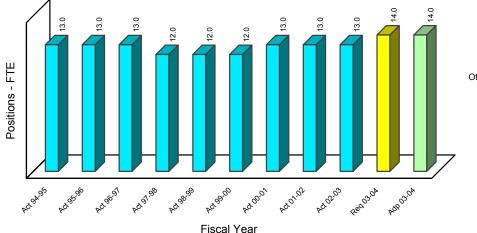
Departmental Structure

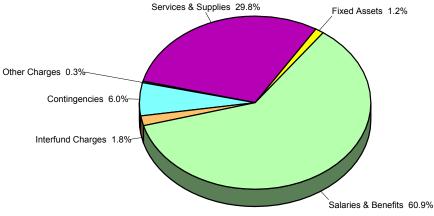
Financing Sources

- The Mission Oaks Recreation and Park District is a dependent special district governed by a five-member Advisory Board of Directors appointed by the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors; the Board of Supervisors serve as ex-officio Directors of the district. It covers a 9.1 square mile area in the Arden-Arcade and Carmichael communities of Sacramento County, an area of approximately 62,500 residents. The Mission Oaks Recreation and Park District:
 - Provides recreation programs and services to residents, including preschoolers, youth, adults, and senior adults.
 - Maintains 11 district-owned parks (88.75 acres).
 - Maintains four school parks (13.7 acres).

MISSION:

To improve the quality of life for Mission Oaks residents by providing varied, interesting, and enjoyable recreation programs for all ages, and parks and facilities that are safe, clean, functional and aesthetically pleasing.

GOALS:

- Complete the listed park projects by the end of Fiscal Year 2003-04.
- Continue to implement recommendations from the 1999-00 and 2000-01 audits, including the development of a Fixed Asset data base that supports the county COMPASS system.
- Continue with the development of a marketing and revenue-generating plan that will provide new activities for the community.
- Continue with the development and implementation of the district employee data base.

SIGNIFICANT DEVELOPMENTS DURING 2002-03:

- Full utilization and integration of the county's COMPASS financial system.
- Replaced the drapery at Mission Oaks Community Center.
- Replacement of the shade shelter at Ashton Park.
- Replacement of the playground equipment at Valley Oak Park.

- Installation of new parks signs for Mission North, Ashton, and Gibbons parks.
- Purchase of Windstar van to replaced the Chevrolet Blazer.
- Purchase of a power lift gate for F350 and a wood splitter.

- Natomas Fire District funds the provision of fire protection services to approximately 40 square miles of the Unincorporated Area in the northwestern portion of Sacramento County. Natomas Fire District is a dependent special district; and the Board of Supervisors serves as the Board of Directors for the District.
- Fire protection service is actually provided by the Fire Department of the City of Sacramento. The District and the City entered into the contract in Fiscal Year 1984-85. All district assets, including equipment and real property, were turned over to the City. The City absorbed all district employees who did not retire at the time.
- The contract calls for the annual payment to the City for the fire protection service to amount to all available financing, less administrative expenditures such as biannual audits, property tax administration fees, and administrative service charges.

- District financing consists of property taxes (including the homeowners subvention), interest earnings, and fund balances.
- The Community Development and Neighborhood Assistance Agency is responsible for monitoring the contract with the City and preparing the district budget.

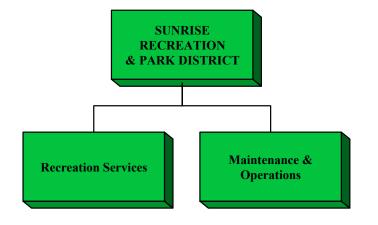

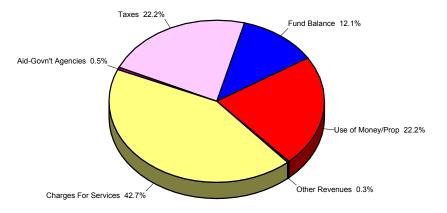

Departmental Structure

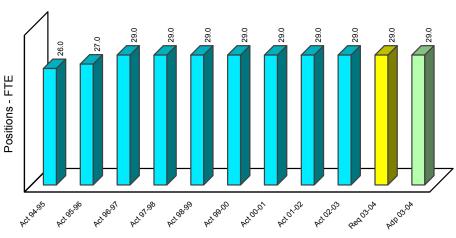
Financing Sources



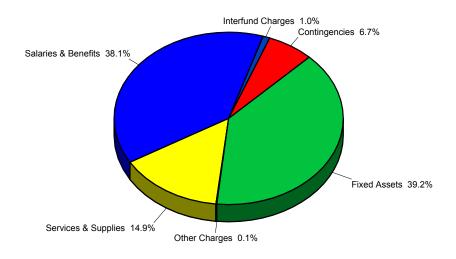


Staffing Trend

• Provides park facilities and recreation services for the City of Citrus Heights, and the unincorporated communities of Antelope and Foothill Farms, a 27 square mile area in northern Sacramento County.

MISSION:

The mission of the Sunrise Recreation and Park District is to be responsive to its communities' needs for an enhanced quality of life and to advocate for positive social interaction by offering a variety of affordable recreation and learning

opportunities to individuals of all ages and abilities; providing clean, safe, welldesigned parks and facilities; strengthening community image and sense of place; supporting economic development; promoting health and wellness; fostering human development; increasing cultural unity; protecting environmental resources; facilitating community problem solving; and collaborating with Community Partners.

GOALS:

Park Acquisition and Development

- Acquire sufficient park lands for present and future needs.
- Work closely with the City of Citrus Heights and the communities of Foothill Farms and Antelope to expand recreational opportunities, promote and enhance service delivery, and identify properties for acquisition.
- Assist in establishing multi-use trail and parkway systems within the District, consistent with the countywide system.
- Encourage the dedication of sufficient park lands and the provision of open space corridors associated with new development in an orderly manner harmonious with the District's Ten-Year Master Plan.
- Coordinate park site acquisition, development, and recreation programs with school districts, other special districts, county agencies, and related private organizations.

Programming

- Provide recreational opportunities and facilities to meet the physical, social, environmental and cultural programming needs of the District residents.
- Provide a park system which shall serve the needs of all ages, interest groups, and persons of varied economic levels.
- Foster community ownership by making District programs and facilities part of residents' lifestyles.
- Continue to expand recreational programs and opportunities conforming with public desire and the District's capabilities.

Planning

- Plan for the improvement of existing parks and development of proposed parks, maintaining a balance between active and passive recreational opportunities.
- Seek public input on park issues in an effort to enhance awareness of the District, its facilities, programs and services.
- Anticipate needs and recognize trends and innovations in appropriate technology.
- Utilize financial resources efficiently and equitably.

SIGNIFICANT DEVELOPMENTS IN 2002-03:

- Coordinated with developer purchase agreement for "turn key" (Stock Ranch) Neighborhood Park site.
- Completed renovation/construction of Rusch Community Park Swim Center.
- Constructed a new ADA accessible Rest Room located at Rusch Community Park.
- Installed a new "prefabricated" restroom at the Rusch Community Park Swim Center.
- Master Planned three neighborhood park sites (Almond Grove Park, Roseview Park, and Firestone Park).
- Installed replacement play equipment at Eugene H. Ahner Park.
- Installed replacement play equipment and repaired concrete walkways at Westwood Park.
- Designed and began construction of a Skate Park located at Rusch Community Park.
- Installed a radio communications tower at Rusch Community Park to support computerized irrigation in most of the District's parks.
- Implemented assessment district as approved by the voters in the Antelope area.

- Purchase 4.5 acre neighborhood park as part of the Stock Ranch Development in Citrus Heights.
- Complete first phase construction of Almond Grove neighborhood park (4.5 acres) in Antelope.
- Begin first phase construction of Firestone neighborhood park (7 acres) in Antelope.
- Begin first phase construction of Roseview neighborhood park (7 acres) in Antelope.
- Renovate tennis courts, picnic reservation area and children's play equipment at Foothill Community Park in the Foothill Farms.
